Total spend: £23000 117%

There was 24% (£4700) of previous budget carried forward due to previous years underspend. Some was earmarked and used for swimming catch up for Y5/6 (£260), much less than expected due to parent contributions). The 17% overspend (£3000) can therefore be taken out of this, leaving £1700 (8.5%) to carry over to next year.

Overspend is higher than expected due to:

- Increase in transport costs; £1000 up on last year, incl £600 on non-refundable cancelled coach hire (less than 24hrs notice) for events cancelled due to adverse weather.
- Rise in next academic years affiliation costs that are paid in advance (incl new OPAL college); approx £1000.

The 8.5% underspend left will be carried over to help fund the Y5/6 catch up swimming sessions and the specialist coaches to aid teacher CPD, pupil experiences and dedicated after school clubs that have taken the total Sport premium overspend to 17%. The rest of the overspend (8.5%) will be funded by introducing a requested voluntary contribution of £1.50 per session for all external coach led clubs to balance Sport Premium spend which is projected to raise £2500 (13%), leaving a 4.5% margin for increased costs.
